

MINUTES BOROUGH OF NEW MILFORD 7:00 PM PUBLIC SESSION MEETING CLOSED SESSION IMMEDIATELY FOLLOWING Monday, March 22, 2021

PUBLIC SESSION:

Mayor Putrino called the meeting to order, asked for a moment of silent prayer and/or reflection and led the flag salute. Mayor Putrino read the Open Public Meeting Law and Mission Statement. The meeting was held by electronic means, in accordance with law. The Mayor read an announcement regarding public comments during remote meetings.

COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS:

Council President Grant made a motion to file Committee Reports with the Borough Clerk to be spread in full upon the minutes. Councilwoman Sandhusen seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley made a motion to approve the minutes from the March 8, 2021 Work and Closed Session meetings. Councilwoman Duffie seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

NEW BUSINESS:

INTRODUCE ORDINANCE 2021:04

CALENDAR YEAR 2021 ORDINANCE TO EXCEED THE MUNICPAL BUDGET APPROPRIATIONS LIMITS AND TO ESTABLISH A CAP BANK (N.J.S.A. 40A:4-45.14)

Councilman Grotsky made a motion to introduce the ordinance on the first reading. Councilwoman Duffie seconded the motion. The motion carried on a roll call vote. All present in favor, none opposed.

Mayor Putrino asked the Borough Auditor, Steve Wielkotz, to review the budget introduction.

Mr. Wielkotz started by explaining that the Cap Bank Ordinance preserves \$1.6 million of cap space that the borough is not using. By virtue of the ordinance, it is carried over to the next year's budget should it be needed to cover additional appropriations within the spending limits.

Mr. Wielkotz went on to report on the upcoming bond sale, the purpose of which is to consolidate the short-term notes for all the projects undertaken by the Borough over the last five or six years. In conjunction with the bond sale, the Borough participated in a conference call with Moody's to establish the Borough's rating, which was assigned at AA2, the third highest rating. He said AAA is reserved for larger areas such as the County and AA1 which is generally assigned to larger municipalities. He read the following from the Moody's press release:

The AA2 rating reflects the Borough's strong governance. Management has a history of conservative budgeting as seen in its recent strong financial performance.

He said the credit opinion identifies healthy finances as one of the Borough's credit strengths and says the Borough's financial position will remain strong in the medium term, as management continues to budget conservatively. He said the scorecard, which is part of the opinion, identifies three areas where the Borough is rated AAA: median family income; fund balance as a percent of revenue; and cash balance as a percent of revenue. He said this a glowing recommendation of the governing body, under the leadership of the Mayor and he would expect it to reflect favorably when the Borough goes out for bids on the bond later this week.

Regarding the budget, Mr. Wielkotz acknowledged the challenges of 2020 and said the Borough managed to regenerate most of the surplus that had been anticipated in the 2020 budget. He said the 2021 budget represents a spending increase of .82%, less than 1%, over the 2020 budget. He said the increase is attributable to increases in pensions, insurance and the BCUA sewer fees and noted all other expenses are coming in at \$33,000 less than 2020. He said the municipal tax impact on the average residential assessment of \$329,799 is an increase of \$69. He said there were some issues with revenue in 2020, in the municipal court, recreation, and recycling and for this reason the Borough has adopted a resolution to allow the use of a three-year average to anticipate revenues for 2021. Mr. Wielkotz said the recently adopted economic relief package has allocated funds to every municipality, 50% of which the Borough will receive this year with the remaining 50% coming in next year. He said some of that money will pay off the small special emergency, which was authorized last year to offset the shortfall in revenue. He said we are awaiting further guidance from the state but may be able to use some of this money to offset revenue in the 2021 budget to reduce the \$69 increase. He said the borough should proceed with the public hearing on April 26th, but may benefit from holding off on the adoption until there is further guidance from the state.

2021:106 Introduce 2021 Municipal Budget

Councilman Grotsky made a motion to approve resolution 2021:106. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried on a roll call vote. All present in favor, none opposed.

INTRODUCE ORDINANCE 2021:05

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER XXX, ARTICLE IV, SECTION 30-20.6 OF THE REVISED GENERAL ORDINANCES OF THE BOROUGH OF NEW MILFORD ENTITLED

"PROHIBITED USES" TO PROHIBIT THE OPERATION OF ANY CLASS OF CANNABIS BUSINESSES WITHIN ITS GEOGRAPHICAL BOUNDARIES

Councilwoman Duffie made a motion to introduce this ordinance on the first reading. Councilman Seymour seconded the motion. The motion carried on a roll call vote. All present in favor, none opposed.

The ordinance will be advertised, and a public hear will be held on April 12, 2021.

1. Outdoor Dining Permits

Mr. Kelly said the permit process, to allow restaurants to engage in outdoor dining, was codified by statute at the end of February. He said it is different from what was allowed previously, in that it permits the use of the sidewalk in addition to the use of private property. He referenced the memo he circulated previously which outlines the legislation. He said P.L. 2021, c. 15 calls for an application, sketch, litter control plan and consent of the owners, in addition to a certificate of insurance, naming the Borough as an additional insured, and an indemnification agreement. He said the temporary COVID liquor license expansion permit has been adopted within this legislation, which runs through November 20, 2022 or until the Governor lifts the indoor capacity limitations. Also new, the outdoor dining area cannot encumber more than 75% of the parking and one accessible parking space must be provided. As per the legislation, applications are to be reviewed and approved by the Zoning Officer.

The Administrator said the new application has been sent to all the restaurants that are currently participating in outdoor dining and it has been posted on the borough website.

2. Barrel & Brew Place-to-Place Transfer

Mr. Kelly said Barrel & Brew has submitted an application to expand the existing liquor license to the adjacent storefront. He said the applicant has met the publication requirements and a hearing is only required in the event of an objection. He administered an oath to the licensee, Albert Tirado and invited questions or comments from the governing body.

Councilwoman Duffie asked Mr. Tirado to enter into the record his plans for the expansion. Mr. Tirado said with the additional space he would enlarge the seating area and the liquor store and add a kitchen for food service. Councilwoman Duffie asked if the package store would be relocated to the newly vacated storefront. Mr. Tirado confirmed this to be true.

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley asked how many tables were being added. Mr. Tirado said there are twenty seats at the bar with limited seating around the bar. He said this would add bench seating on the sidewall, which will accommodate ten tables. Council President Grant said this is not consistent with the sketch, which shows ten seats at the bar and eight tables. Mr. Tirado said the sketch was intended to show the concept, he confirmed there would be ten tables. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley asked for details of the food to be served. Mr. Tirado said it would be upscale bar food.

Being no further questions from the governing body, Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley made a motion to open to the public. Councilman Grotsky seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

Jude Ezeh -218D Faller Drive. Mr. Ezeh asked for clarification on the seating capacity. Mr. Tirado said he will not know the exact capacity until the certificate of occupancy is issued. Mr. Ezeh expressed concern regarding the parking and how it would affect the residents of the nearby apartment complex. Mr. Ezeh was advised that the parking lot is private property, not residential parking.

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley asked if Mr. Tirado would be adding additional outdoor seating. Mr. Tirado said he would not be adding additional outdoor seating.

Being no other member of the public who wished to comment, Councilman Seymour made a motion to close to the public. Council President Grant seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

Council President Grant said she wished the diagram accurately represented what is proposed. Mr. Kelly said the specifics of the layout will be reviewed and approved by the Building department. He said the only thing before the governing body is whether they consent to the expansion of the liquor license, which is contemplated under resolution 2021:116.

3. Repeal of NJSA 40:48-1.2

Mr. Kelly said the recent cannabis legislation from the State impacts other laws, one of which is the decriminalization of cannabis and use by minors under the age of 21. He said the enabling legislation repeals any ordinance enacted pursuant to 40:48-1.2, which also includes underage drinking on private property. Mr. Kelly said the Borough addresses this under the general Police ordinance of Prohibited Behavior, 3-8.1, 24. He said the cannabis legislation preempts this ordinance, it is no longer enforceable and needs to be removed from the Borough ordinances. He said he will prepare the ordinance to repeal it and it will be on a future agenda.

4. Schedule Updates

Hippity Hoppity Trail – 10 AM – 12 Noon, Saturday, March 27th, to be held on Cecchino Drive. Rain date of Saturday, April 3rd. The event is being sponsored by the NMPD, NMFD, NMVAC, Recreation and the Mayor and Council.

5. COVID-19 Task Force Report

The Covid-19 Task Force met on March 18th. There were reports from the NMPD, NMFD, OEM, Ambulance Corps, Health Department, Administration, DPW, Recreation, and the Board of Education. Some of the topics discussed included the status of the New Milford vaccination site, the reverse 911 initiative, the expansion of indoor/outdoor dining, the Hippity Hoppity Drive by on 3/27 and the anticipation of more requests for permission to hold events. The next meeting is scheduled for April 1st.

6. Administrator's Report

- A pre-application meeting was held with the DEP on March 11th to discuss the applications for the Madison Avenue Sidewalk Project and the Culvert Project. The DEP has 20 days, from the date of submission, to determine completion and 90 additional days to review the application. Based upon this timeline, we do not expect to have DEP permits for either project before September.
- Referencing two resolutions forwarded to the governing body earlier in the day, the Administrator asked for a motion to add resolutions, 2021:117 to denounce APPI hate and 2021:118 to appoint Robert Sherrow as the Building Subcode Official, to the agenda
 - Council President Grant made a motion to add the resolutions to the agenda. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.
- Online, fillable forms will be launching on the borough website within the next few weeks. Many of the Borough's applications and forms will be able to be paid for and submitted online.
- The Borough will be closed on Friday, April 2nd in observance of Good Friday
- The next meeting of the Mayor and Council is scheduled for Monday, April 12th

COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley made a motion to open the meeting for public comment. Councilman Seymour seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

Jude Ezeh -218 D Faller Drive. Mr. Ezeh asked how the governing body was collaborating with the Board of Education to move toward the goal of reopening schools five days per week. Mr. Kelly advised that this is outside of the governing body's jurisdiction; it lies solely within the purview of the Board of Education.

As the record reflects that no other member of the public wished to comment, Councilman Seymour made a motion to close to the public. Council President Grant seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

COUNCIL

Councilman Seymour said the BOE met and reviewed the latest guidelines from the CDC and the State Board of Health. He said Recreation has been working hard on the roll out of spring sports with games set to begin in April. He thanked residents for their patience and the Mayor for his leadership. Mayor Putrino commented on the large numbers of people congregating at the basketball courts and asked for everyone to be responsible while using the courts, maintaining distance, and wearing masks. He also commented on the amount of litter that has been left at the recreation fields. He said there are ample trash and recycling receptables and asked all to be respectful in their use of the fields.

Council President Grant reported on the popularity of the children's programs at the Library, noting there are waiting lists for some of the programs. She said Library workers will be eligible for vaccinations in April, as part of the 1C group. She said curbside pickup continues to be very popular.

Councilwoman Sandhusen said the Environmental Commission will hold a dedication of the New Milford Woods on Sunday, April 25th. She said a subcommittee of the Environmental Commission will be researching electronic vehicle charging stations and noted that the New Milford Woods received a mention in the recent edition of the Hackensack Riverkeeper's Tidelines. Councilwoman Sandhusen said the Green Team now has a presence on the Borough's website and they are continuing to work toward the Sustainable Jersey certification. She said the recently awarded a technical assistance grant, will help to develop a baseline for borough energy efficiency. Councilwoman Sandhusen reported the Joint Insurance Fund will be giving each member municipality \$1,000 toward their safety incentive program. She reminded the governing body to complete the Elected Official Training, which is being offered virtually.

Councilman Grotsky reported that the NMPD recently achieved NJSACP accreditation, which promotes best practices in policing. He said the process took more than a year to complete and he thanked Det. Lt. Van Saders, Chief Clancy, and the entire department for their efforts in earning this accreditation.

Councilwoman Duffie reported on the ceremony held March 15th, to honor the fifty-one New Milford lives lost to COVID and to mark the one-year anniversary since the first death in New Milford. She said the Mayor and Council came together to light fifty-one luminarias to represent each life.

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley commented on Historic Preservation's oral history project and said they would be meeting at 11:00 AM on April 9th at the gazebo to collect stories from anyone who would like to contribute. She said they have also received a CD of a recording that a resident made with his grandfather and they are looking at how it could be incorporated into the project. She said the Public Events Committee is creating a Facebook page to enable them to livestream events.

VOTE ON RESOLUTIONS

Council President Grant made a motion to approve the consent agenda, consisting of resolutions 2021:107 through 2021:118. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

Mayor Putrino said the governing body would be going into closed session. He said no further action would be taken and the meeting will be adjourned immediately upon returning to open session.

Councilwoman Duffie made a motion to go into closed session. Council President Grant seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed. Time 8:21 PM.

WHEREAS, in New Jersey there were 59 incidents directed against Asian Americans according to Stop AAPI Hate between March 2020 and February 2021, the eighth most of any individual state; and

WHEREAS, Anti-Asian hate crimes increased by nearly 150% in 2020 according to the Center for the Study of Hate and Extremism; and

WHEREAS, a Pew Research Center survey found that 3 in 10 Asian Americans reported having experienced racial slurs or racist jokes in the last 12 months; and

WHEREAS, history has shown that racism and xenophobia have caused harm upon communities of color as well as other marginalized populations and society as a whole; and

WHEREAS, President Biden has said "We cannot be complicit" and must speak out against such hate.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of New Milford condemn and denounce racism, xenophobia and intolerance in all forms;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Mayor and Council of the Borough of New Milford stand in solidarity with the Asian, Asian American and Pacific Islanders communities;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to Governor Murphy, Senate President Sweeny, Assembly Speaker Coughlin, Senator Joseph Lagana, Assemblywoman Lisa Swain, Assemblyman Chris Tully and Bergen County Executive Jim Tedesco.
