#### MINUTES BOROUGH OF NEW MILFORD 7:00 PM WORK SESSION Monday, April 8, 2019



#### WORK SESSION:

Mayor Putrino read the Open Public Meeting and Mission Statements. Mayor Putrino led the flag salute

Council President Duffie made a motion to go into closed session. Councilwoman Grant seconded the motion. All present in favor, none opposed. Time 7:07 PM.

#### **CLOSED SESSION:**

- 2. Review of Closed Session Minutes

At the conclusion of the closed session, Councilman Grotsky made a motion to return to open session. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed. Time 7:17 PM.

#### **OPEN SESSION:**

1. Pancho's Burritos - Cinco de Mayo

The Administrator read an email from Det. Lt. Van Saders regarding the security company. Det. Lt. Van Saders noted that the security company is in good standing but confirmed that their insurance company will not renew their insurance prior to the expiration on 4/26/19.

Mr. Kelly said there has been some inconsistency in the past as far as what was allowed vs. what was approved. He said that whatever is approved should be consistent with what is permitted at the event.

The Council discussed the proposed use of the sidewalk and voiced concerns about the outside service bar, the mechanical bull, the occupancy limits of the restaurant and the inability to confirm insurance coverage for the security company on the day of the event.

Mr. Kelly advised that the Council could deny the application, based on what has been presented to date, and provide the applicant with an opportunity to be heard at the meeting on April 22<sup>nd</sup>. All agreed to proceed in that manner. The applicant will be notified that the

application has been denied and that he will be given an opportunity to be heard at the next meeting.

#### 2. Ordinance 3-8.1 – Prohibited Acts

Mr. Kelly referenced item a. 23 (e) of the ordinance which provides for the Mayor and Council, the Recreation Commission and the Board of Education to issue permits for the possession or consumption of alcoholic beverages in a designated park or other public place. He said the ordinance should be modified to remove the reference to the Recreation Commission. After discussion, the Council agreed that the reference to the Board of Education should be removed as well.

The ordinance will be revised and prepared for introduction at the meeting on April 22<sup>nd</sup>.

#### 3. COAH Administrative Agent

The Administrator said the Borough needs to appoint an Administrative Agent to assist with its affordable housing obligations. She said the expense can be funded out of the Borough's COAH trust account.

The Administrator said she requested a proposal from three vendors and received two. She asked the borough planner for the name of another company and he referred her to CGP&H, from whom she received a third proposal. She provided the Council with an overview of the three proposals and noted that the proposal from CGP&H appears to be the most cost effective.

Mayor Putrino said he would be inclined to work with CGP&H as they were recommended by the planner and have the most favorable pricing. The members of the Council agreed. A resolution to appoint CGP&H will be prepared for the next meeting.

#### 4. DOT 2020 Applications

The Administrator said she spoke with Millennium Strategies with regard to a possible application for sidewalks on Madison Avenue to run from the bridge near Main Street to the back of the high school.

She said in addition, she met with Capital Alternatives and they suggested other potential projects including Boulevard Section 10 (Ridge to East Woodland), Boulevard Section 11 (McKinley to Madison), Boulevard Section 12 (Main Street to Madison – southbound lane only) and River Road from Center to the Oradell town line.

She said all of the applications proposed would be for the Municipal Aid application, which will be announced later this year. She said in addition the Borough could apply for discretionary aid at any time but noted that there are two applications that have already been submitted and have yet to be funded.

The Mayor and Council agreed to pursue the application for the sidewalks on Madison Avenue with Millennium Strategies.

#### 5. Firehouse Internet

Councilwoman Greco-Langschultz said the Fire Department has been researching internet options because their current upload and download speeds are not adequate to support the CAD reporting they need to do. She said they looked at what both Optimum and Verizon could provide and would like to upgrade to the Verizon 75Mb upload/75Mb download at a cost of \$79.99 per month, per firehouse. She said they believe this will be sufficient to support the required reporting and it is the least expensive of the options. She said, with the installation fee of \$99.99 per firehouse, it would be approximately \$2,100 for the first year.

Councilwoman Greco-Langschultz made a motion to approve the request for the upgrade to 75Mb/75Mb. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried on a roll call vote. All present in favor, none opposed.

6. Approval of the minutes from the March 25, 2019 Closed, Work and Public Sessions

Councilwoman Grant made a motion to approve the minutes from the March 25, 2019 Closed, Work and Public Sessions. Council President Duffie seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

#### 7. Administrator's Report

The Administrator reported that demolition has begun on the second round of Blue Acres acquisitions with 531 Columbia on April 8<sup>th</sup> and 549 Columbia on April 9<sup>th</sup>. She said eleven houses will be demolished in this round and there have been two additional closings, which will be part of a future round of demolitions.

The Administrator reminded the governing body of the mandatory JIF Elected Officials Online Employment Practices seminar which must be completed by April 30<sup>th</sup>.

The Administrator advised that the Borough will be closed on April 19<sup>th</sup> in observance of Good Friday. She said she will be finalizing the April 22<sup>nd</sup> agenda on Wednesday, April 17<sup>th</sup>.

The Administrator reminded the governing body of the Volunteer Appreciation dinner, to recognize the volunteers from all the borough boards, commissions and committees, scheduled for Monday, April 15<sup>th</sup> at 7:00 PM.

Mayor Putrino said he would like to add the appointment of Larry Mintz, as the representative of the Ambulance Corps, to the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Committee. Councilman Grotsky made a motion to add the appointment. Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

#### COMMENTS FROM THE PUBLIC

Councilman Grotsky made a motion to open the meeting for public comment. Councilwoman Grant seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

Milford and Lt. Brian Clancy for the Position of Chief of Police

Patrick Crane – 255 Prospect Avenue. Mr. Crane recounted his experience, as a resident of Prospect Avenue, during the previous year's Cinco de Mayo event at Pancho's Burritos. He said an ambulance was dispatched at about 9:30 PM, there were people vomiting on resident's lawns and it was not possible to pass on the sidewalk in front of the restaurant. He said the restaurant only conforms to the parking requirements with the addition of the lot next door and if they use the lot for a tent, the parking is lost. He asked the governing body to consider his concerns and the concerns of the neighborhood.

Being no other member of the public that wished to comment, Council President Duffie made a motion to close to the public. Councilwoman Grant seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

#### COUNCIL

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley asked to have Stigma Free signs posted at the four entrances to town. The Administrator will coordinate with the DPW to have the signs installed.

Councilwoman Sirocchi-Hurley asked if the appointment of Mike Perrone, as the Borough Historian, by the Historic Preservation Commission, needs to be memorialized by the Mayor and Council. Mr. Kelly said it is an honorary position and as such, the Commission can adopt a resolution to be forwarded to the Mayor and Council. He said if the Commission would like the position to be formalized by ordinance, they can request this of the Council.

Councilman Grotsky reported that work has begun on both Faller Drive and Graphic Boulevard.

Mayor Putrino said he attended the 27<sup>th</sup> Annual Mayor's Legislative Day in Trenton on April 5<sup>th</sup>. He said the DCA made a presentation on their division of Shared Services, which could be of assistance to municipalities who would like to pursue a shared service.

Council President Duffie said she has learned that Oradell will be meeting with New Jersey Transit about improvements to their garage. She asked if New Milford should ask to participate in the discussion. Mayor Putrino said that we have requested a meeting with NJ Transit and that this would be one of the topics for discussion. Mr. Kelly said that any proposed improvements to the garage would likely go before Oradell's land use board and New Milford would receive notice of the application.

Council President Duffie said the Environmental Commission is reviewing plastic bag ordinances and plans to make a recommendation to the Mayor and Council. She said the Commission will also be submitting a grant application later this week.

#### **VOTE ON RESOLUTIONS**

Councilwoman Grant made a motion to approve the consent agenda consisting of resolutions 2019:98 through 2019:103. Councilman Grotsky seconded the motion. The motion carried. All present in favor, none opposed.

A RESOLUTION URGING THE NEW JERSEY BOARD OF PUBLIC UTILITIES TO REQUIRE LANDLINE AND WIRELESS TELEPHONE SERVICE UTILITIES TO IMPLEMENT THE NECESSARY TECHNOLOGY TO BLOCK ROBOCALLS TO THEIR CUSTOMERS, FREE OF CHARGE, AND TO ENACT REGULATIONS TO PREVENT ROBOCALLS FROM REACHING CUSTOMERS

WHEREAS, A "robocall" is a telephone call often placed by telemarketers who use a computerized auto dialer to deliver a pre-recorded message; and

WHEREAS "Telephone scammers" are individuals or groups that make unsolicited phone calls to individuals with the purpose of stealing money or personal information. Scams may come through phone calls from real people, robocalls, or text messages. The Scammers often make false promises, such as opportunities to buy products, invest money, or receive free product trials. Scammers may also offer money through free grants and lotteries. Some scammers call pretending to be from government agencies, such as the IRS with threats of jail or lawsuits if they are not paid; and

WHEREAS, "Neighbor spoofing", otherwise known as "NPA-NXX spoofing", is a form of caller ID fraud used by telemarketers, scammers, and robocallers. "Neighbor spoofing" uses auto-dialing and VoIP (Voice over Internet Protocol) services to send unsolicited phone calls. These calls have an outgoing Caller ID that closely matches your area code and phone number. By mimicking their caller ID as closely as possible to the phone number they are placing the call to, spammers can trick more of their targets into answering the phone. This strategy ultimately increases the odds spammers will successfully get victims to give up personal information scammers can use to steal; and

WHEREAS, Under federal law, written consent is required for all robocalls or texts made to a wireless telephone number; further, telemarketers have never been permitted to make robocalls to a wireless telephone number based solely on an "established business relationship" with the customer; and

WHEREAS, Robocalls and Scammer calls have increased in recent years because new technology has made it cheaper and easier for telemarketers and Scammers to make calls from anywhere in the world while hiding their identities by displaying fake caller identification information by using, among other devious tactics, "Neighbor spoofing"; and

WHEREAS, most telephone users consider robocalls and scammer calls to be a nuisance and disruptive and are frustrated with their inability to stop scam or robocalls; and

WHEREAS, Scammer calls in particular place unknowing individuals of our community in peril of economic and emotional hardship; and

WHEREAS, While New Jersey and other states have enacted laws to curtail unwanted scammer and telemarketing calls including robocalls, enforcing these laws has proven difficult as many of the unwanted telemarketing and scammer calls originate out-of-state or from foreign countries; and

WHEREAS, There is technology available that could block scammer and robocalls from reaching customers; and

WHEREAS, Landline and wireless telephone service providers are, for the most part, Public Utilities and within the governing purview of the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities; and

WHEREAS, Landline and wireless telephone service providers can implement the necessary technology that would block robocalls from reaching customers; and

WHEREAS, the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities should enact the necessary regulations to require landline and wireless telephone service providers to block robocalls from reaching their customers.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the Borough of New Milford that the New Jersey Board of Public Utilities is to respectfully urge landline and wireless telephone service providers to implement the necessary technology to block scam and robocalls to their customers, free of charge, and to enact regulations to prevent scam and robocalls from reaching customers; and
